The Harrisburg Marching Bulldogs started their season with a new trailer and a victory at Murphysboro. The group won first place band, best color guard and best drum majors.

DCI is considered to be the major league of marching. Compared to having local judges, this is nerve wracking for some of the students.

"It was tough having to start on the hardest parade with the hardest judges, but we've been working everyday for the past two weeks, and it's really came together," Winkleman said.

With a bigger better band comes great responsibility for those in charge, and this year's section leaders have done a remarkable job, according to Drake.

"With a group this big you have to have help, and our form of help is through our section leaders and drum majors," Drake said. "They are outstanding so far. I know I can rely on them to get the job done and they do. They absolutely step up to the plate and are not afraid to help lead their group and sections."
