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
Crop Judging Contest

Alan Agin, Joddie Harper, Nicole Nease, Robbie Hadley, David Workman, and John Haney participated in the Section 25 FFA Crops Judging Contest. Contestants judged samples of corn, soybeans, wheat, and hay. They also had to identify 20 common weeds and 20 common crop seeds. Scores from the three highest team members were used to determine team scores. Our team scores were made up of Alan Agin, Joddie Harper, and Nicole Nease.

Gallitin Co. placed 1st, NCOE 2nd, Pope Co. 3rd, and Hardin Co. was 4th in the contest. Other schools participating in order of placings were Galatia, McLeansboro,

The Effects of Smoking on Your Skin

It's ironic that when students try to appear more "grown up" by smoking, they may actually, over time, be making their skin look a lot older, in unnattractive ways.

Every day of the year, 5,000 more teens and pre-teens try smoking for the first time. According to the Centers for Disease Control, a government agency that keeps track of the nation's health, the average age when students first try cigarettes is 13... and 90 percent of people who become addicted to smoking start before they're eighteen.

It's well known that smoking is bad for your health. But few people know what it can do to their skin: among other things, it accelerates skin aging. On average, smokers will get wrinkles twenty years before their time. Studies show that a smoking habit triples your chances of getting permature facial wrinkles. Frequent suntanning and drinking, when added to a smoking habit, make people look older, faster.

Another study found that pictures of smoker's faces were estimated, by people who didn't know them, to be four years older than they actually were. This confirms earlier research that found little or no difference in appearance between the skin of a 40- yearold smoker and a 70-year-old non-smoker. The usual effects of smoking on the human face show up in deep wrinkles around the lips and radiating from the corners of the eyes. Years of puckering up the mouth to hold a cigarette and scrunching up the eyes to avoid smoke irritation take their toll on skin.

Other than turning it a yellowish color, smoking has a variety of other documented effects on skin, including the following:

 In any group of people who've had a skin cancer, it's the smokers who are statistically more likely to get another one.

 Smokers is strongly associated with triggering psoriasis and a disorder of the hands and feet called pustolsis.

 Smoking causes abnormal changes to the elastic fibers found in the deeper, connective tissue layer that is the skin's support structure.

 Smoking is a handicap should you ever need surgery -- wounds don't heal as fast, and smoker's scars are larger and darker than average.

* Smoking causes the blood vessels in skin to get smaller, and the blood itself tempoarily thicker, while slowing circulation to the fingers and toes.

 Even people trying to quit using nicotine patches have problems; redness, rashes and swelling resulted in seven percent of people trying to kick the habit.

So, now that you know all of the above, why start? C.R. Rath
