WHAT IS A WILL?

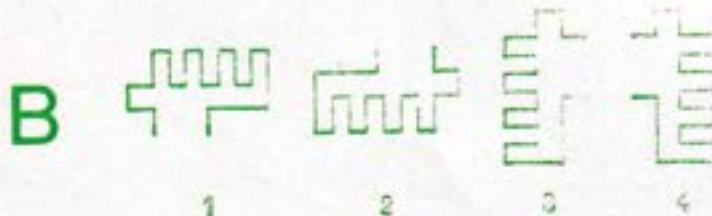
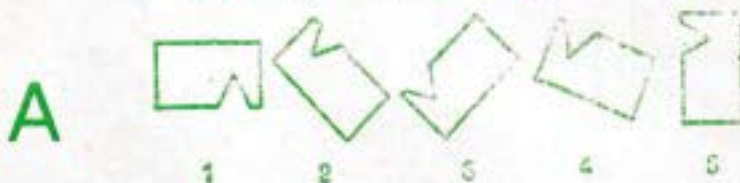
A will is a written direction controlling the disposition of property at death and naming those persons who are to receive the property. The formal requirements for making a will are governed by the laws of each State.

In Illinois:

1. The maker of a will must be at least 18 years old.
2. The maker of the will must be of sound mind.
3. The will must be in writing and witnessed by two or more witnesses in a special manner provided by Illinois law concerning wills.
4. After death the will becomes effective upon being proved and allowed by the Probate Court.

A will may be revoked, modified or added to at any time before death of the maker although all changes to be effective must be done strictly in accordance with the requirements set by the law. Changes are frequently made in wills by the simple device of an addition to the will called a "Codicil." If the maker of a will marries after the will is executed, ordinarily Illinois law treats the marriage as a revocation of the will.

From: Bobbi Fife

Reply: We ask only two things of each student in this High School: First, that he or she act and behave in proper fashion; and second, that he or she perform to the best of their ability.

The tracking system is designed to group students of similar abilities together. It is felt that the teacher can plan and organize the learning experiences to meet the students' needs in better fashion. It is also felt that with this type of ability grouping, the students will be challenged more to learn to the best of their ability.

Diplomas were designed to certify that students had met certain minimum requirements for graduation. Since students are endowed with various abilities and we can expect them to perform only to the best of their ability, it is felt that, in order to be fair, the diplomas should all be the same. However, each student has a permanent record card which reflects their individual performance in High School. Transcripts of these records are sent to colleges, universities, and prospective employers whenever requested by the student. The ultimate in recognition lies within each student as they realize how well they have utilized their own talents in utilizing their educational opportunity to the best of their ability.
