

U.S.-N orth Korea Reach Nuclear Agreement

Long Time Enemies Step Closer To Peace. PYONG'YANG, North Korea-The People's Democratic Republic of Korea and the United States, long time enemies, have reached an agreement which will allow North Korea to operate a nuclear power plant. America's ally, South Korea, has been nervous over the North's nuclear capability, and fought for the agreement, which would make it nearly impossible for North Korea to develop nuclear weapons.

The plant would be American built, then turned over to the PDRK. South Korea proposed a similar idea at the talks in Switzerland just before the death of North Korean leader Kim Il-Sung.

Terrorist Group Strikes Again

Hamas Bombs Tel Aviv; worst attack since 1977. TEL AVIV, Israel- The wave of terrorism which has plagued the small Jewish republic was supposed to have ended last fall when the Palestine Liberation Organization agreed to stop the violence, while Israel granted Palestinians self-rule. Instead, a new group called Hamas, is opposed to the treaty, has started its own reign of terror in Israel.

Earlier this month, Hamas kidnapped an Israeli soldier. When Israeli Defense Force commandoes attempted to rescue him, he was killed. On October 19, Hamas terrorists put a bomb on a bus in downtown Tel Aviv. The bomb exploded, killing twenty-one Israelis, and destroying the surrounding marketplace.

U.K. - IRA Agree To Talk.

Could Bring End To Decades of Violence BELFAST, Northern Ireland- Since 1965, the Irish Republican Army has conducted terrorism against the United Kingdom, planting bombs in train stations, shopping centers, and even near Prime Minister Thatcher's home in 1991. Now all the violence may be coming to an end. The leader of Sinn Fein, the political wing of the IRA, Gerry Adams, agreed to meet with Prime Minister John Major to discuss a possible end to the conflict, which has killed thousands of civilians and military personnel.

Floods in Texas Takes Ten Lives, Leave Hundreds Homeless

Tewnty-six Countries Declared Disaster Areas. HOUSTON, Texas- Massive flooding in the Houston area, resulting from a major mid-October storm, has killed eight people, and left hundreds of victims homeless. The National Weather Service had been watching the storm develop for two days, and had placed flood warnings for most of East Texas just before the storm. Twenty-six counties have been declared federal disaster areas, making them eligible for economic assistance from Washington, and disaster relief efforts from the Federal Emergency Manage-

ment Agency, or FEMA, who came to the aid of flood victims in the midwest last summer.

Restaurant Shooting Kills Three

Similar to 1991 Killeen.

SKOKIE, Illinois- This suburban Chicago community was shook with violence on the 16th of October when three people were killed outside a local restaurant. The shootings occurred at the Great Godfrey Daniels restaurant, when Vincent Languido of Park City, Illinois shot and killed his former wife Serena Languido and her friend. Christopher Latimer in the parking lot with a 9-millimeter semi-automatic pistol. "He was yelling at her, ... and she

was wailing and screaming and kicking" a witness told the Associated Press. Serena Languido died after arriving at an Evanston, Illinois hospital. Latimer died on Monday of his wounds. Vincent Languido shot himself after the attack.

Colorado Man Opens Fire on White House

Bad Year for White House Windows. WASHINGTON, District of Columbia- In the wake of the Cessna 150 crash on the White House lawn in September, another incident has rattled White House security, and once again made America wonder exactly how well is our leader protected. On October 29, a man opened fire with an SKS assault rifle, a Chinese imitation of the famous Soviet built Kalashnikov AK-47, while standing on the sidewalk just off Pennsylvania Avenue. The President was unharmed, he was upstairs watching a col-

lege football game, but several windows were broken in the first floor of the mansion and in the west wing press room, where a technician was struck by flying glass, but left relatively uninjured.

The gunman was attempting to reload the rifle after firing thirty 7.62 millimeter rounds when he was tackled by several shocked onlookers, and held down until Secret Service agents arrived to take him into custody.
