Harrisburg High School tenth graders will take part in an exciting program this fall offered by ACT. The program, called PLAN, includes academic tests, a survey of interests, and an assessment of study skills knowledge. Students who participate in PLAN get a head start on career and educational planning: PLAN results help them plan their remaining two years of high school and set career and educational goals for their life after high school.

When asked how PLAN will help sophomores in planning for the future, Guidance Counselor Susan Aljabori said, "I think that all sophomores should take the test because it allows the students to prepare for the ACT. I have seen cases in which other schools have given the test and their students scores rose four to five points."

Police have no real leads in the case. The only possible link being an arson fire in a duplex in Canada, where another cult was stockpiling weapons for the end of the war. Some items were able to be recovered. These include some of the cult's literature, various religious items, along with an audiotape. They hope these will explain why another cult perished.

International Haiti Saga Continues. Second American Marine commits suicide.

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti-The U.S. occupation of Haiti has taken a tragic turn. A Marine committed suicide on Oct. 4 aboard USS Nashville in PuertRico after the invasion. This is the second suicide and third casualty for U.S. forces. The Pentagon would not release the name or unit. It is known that the cause of death was a gunshot to the head.

Plague In India Threatens Asia. Worldwide fear of epidemic.

NEW DELHI, India- A mass outbreak of pnuemonic plague in Southern India has already caused thousands of deaths in Surat, a region of the over populated nation, and now it threatens the entire world. Outbreaks of the plague have been detected around India, spreading faster than the gas from the Union Carbide accident in Bhopal, India ten years ago.

Airport officials around the world have examined all passengers on flights from India and her neighbors Pakistan and Bangladesh, checking for signs of the plague. They fear that people

from the plague striken nation might try to flee, carrying the disease with them. International health officials have confirmed over 2,300 cases of the plague, and more are suspected.

Iraq provokes U.S. into crisis on Kuwait border.

KUWAIT CITY, Kuwait- In August of 1990, this same scenario was presented by Iraq, shortly before that invasion, which resulted in the Guif War. Now, 70,000 Iraqi troops, supported by Iraqi troops massing 700 tanks, and six groups of tactical fighters are again on the border, and it is frightening Washington. The 24th Mechanized Infantry Division deployed from Fort Benning, Georgia, and two more divisions, 1st and 8th Infantry, were put on alert. Three hun-

dred fighters and bombers from the U.S. are in the area, in addition to the carrier George Washington which deployed from the Mediterranean Sea to the Persian Gulf. The Iraqis are pulling back now, but not fast enough. U.S. forces will stay in the region until they are sure that this retreat is for real.

Zoo Serves Duel Purpose: Entertainment and Education

Every year many families decide to take a trip to the zoo, but most families in Southern Illinols find that they must travel long distances to find one. What most people do not know is that Southern Illinois has its own zoo, with an amazing assortment of animals.

The Caleb Bike Farm may not look like much, but there is definitely more than meets the eye. Lipon entering the parking lot, Nadia the camel will be there to greet any visitors. Unlike most zoos, people are allowed to interact with and feed the animals, instead of looking at them from several feet away in cages.

The farm was started several years ago in the northwest suburbs of Chicago and was later moved to the West Frankfurt location. Dan and Lee Rodden, cofounders, decided they needed their own farm when the northern Illinois location kept growing. After looking for appropriate land all over the country, they decided on West Frankfort.

The Caleb Bike Farm got its name through a comparison with a truck farm. It is like farms that used trucks to bring produce into town for sale. It's called the "bike farm" because kids can not drive trucks.

Children ages 6 to 18 work for the farm. The Rodden's try to teach them the principles of economics by letting them work two hours a week. They tend to their own vegetables and do other farm chores.

The kids who work here also take classes. They learn how to invest, save, and give the money they earn. Another lesson is how to care for and raise animals.

"If a kid grows a tomato, tends to it, sells it, and profits from it, he's found the joy of fruitful labor," Rodden said, taken from Evansville Courier. He believes that as people have progressed to cities and out of the farm, children have lost any sense of responsibility. He says normal household chores are not fruitful labors.

Rodden also believes the overall response to the situation has been a failure. Kids are being provided with activities that are all fun and games and not fruitful. As a result, today's youth rely on others to entertain them when they are bored.

The Bike Farm's motto is "We 'grow' kids". The program is an excellent example of the potential of the Christian work ethic. What started out as a piece of dirt and a cow has turned into a farm of more than 100 animals and nine acres.

The original concept was to have a program for kids in which they could work and receive something in return. The animals became a way to fund the program. The money from the farm comes from the sale of animals raised there and the tours and shows done with the animals.

The newest addition to the farm is a Bactrian camel. Rodden claims they needed a camel to represent the area known as Little Egypt.

The most popular animal is the monkey, Little Mac, who helps promote reading by attending classes. At the end of each tour, kids can get their picture taken with a parrot, a llama, or Mac. Most choose Mac.

Other zoo animals include Grace the miniature donkey, Alfonsie the African grey goose, a four horned Jacob sheep, two California red sheep, a herd of Ilamas, wallabies, and much more

Every animal has a lessoneither through it's name or a lesson for life through the way the animal lives. Grace is the same type of donkey Mary rode to Bethlehem. Alfonsie the goose is named after the first Christian king in Africa.

The Caleb Bike Farm is a bargain-just one dollar a person. It is open daily from 9 a.m. until dusk. The farm serves a duel purpose- as entertainment for the public and to provide children with a successful program of work.
